Red Panda Facts!

Red pandas inhabit the eastern Himalayan temperate broadleaved forest. They are endemic to the Himalayas in Nepal, India, Bhutan, Myanmar (Burma) and southern China.

The red panda has an enlarged wrist bone, called a radial sesamoid, that forms an "extra thumb" which is used to grasp bamboo for more efficient eating.

The red panda had been previously classified in the families Procyonidae (raccoons) and Ursidae (bears). However, recent research has placed them in their own family, Ailuridae, in superfamily Musteloidea along with Mustelidae and Procyonidae.

Red pandas are crepuscular, arboreal and solitary. They are most active in the early morning and late afternoon (crepuscular) spending most of the day resting in trees (arboreal) to conserve their energy.
