Citizen Science Professional Development for Educators

Many of you may be familiar with the original course that included FrogWatch USA, [Introduction to Citizen Science: Explorations in Educational Settings](#). Now in its third year, that course provides educators with an overview of citizen science and an in-depth look at five active programs, including FrogWatch USA.

We have now partnered with them on a second course, [Using Citizen Science Data in the Classroom](#)! This course is designed with both K-12 formal and informal educators in mind, and is designed to provide the tools necessary to incorporate citizen science data into educational settings. This month begins the inaugural offering of this course.

Seasonal wetlands are likely to have already dried up or are in the process of drying. If you monitor at a seasonal wetland, breeding activity may have already ended for the year. However, sites with more permanent bodies of water likely are still supporting calling frogs and toads. Visit your site this holiday weekend and listen for calls, or possibly look for signs of young metamorphs!
